### Postdoctoral Fellows



**Zily Burstein**University of Chicago >> Weizmann Institute of Science

Zily Burstein was awarded a Fulbright Postdoctoral Fellowship to pursue her research project, "The Regulatory Mechanism of DNA Transcription," with Professor Naama Barkai at the Weizmann Institute of Science. Zily's main interest is in the physics of complex systems and in the application of physics theory to questions in cellular biology. Her current project in the Barkai Lab seeks to advance our understanding of the dynamics regulating the efficiency and specificity of transcription factor binding to DNA. Zily received her PhD in physics at the University of Chicago, where she developed a model for color vision processing in the visual cortex.



**Chet Bush**University of Mississippi >> Hebrew University of Jerusalem

Chet Bush was awarded a Fulbright Postdoctoral Fellowship to pursue his research project, "Jerusalem, Sacred Tourism, and the American Civil Rights Movement" at The Hebrew University of Jerusalem. In this project, he researches the presence of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in Israel and studies the impact that religious tourism had on the 1968 Poor People's Campaign, the American Civil Rights Movement, and a burgeoning civil rights tourism. He examines religious tourism as a framework for both personal pilgrimage and community economic uplift.

Prior to his studies in Jerusalem, Bush taught American History at the University of Mississippi. He holds degrees from Trevecca Nazarene University (B.A. in Religion), Nazarene Theological Seminary (M.Div.), and the University of Mississippi (M.A. and Ph.D. in History). His research on the 1968 Poor People's Campaign Mule Train was conducted under the direction of Professor Ted Ownby.



Roie Levin
Carnegie Mellon University >> Tel Aviv University

Roie Levin was awarded a Fulbright Postdoctoral Fellowship to pursue his project "Online and Dynamic Algorithms for Linear Programming" with Dr. Niv Buchbinder at Tel Aviv University. He completed a B.Sc. in Computer Science/Applied Mathematics as well as a B.Sc. in Mathematics at Brown University, after which he spent two years as a predoctoral fellow at the Allen Institute for Artificial Intelligence in Seattle. Roie's PhD is in Algorithms, Combinatorics and Optimization (ACO) at Carnegie Mellon University under the supervision of Prof. Anupam Gupta. Roie's research spans algorithms for uncertain environments (online/dynamic/streaming algorithms), and submodular optimization (the discrete cousin of convex optimization).



Julia Reed
Harvard University >> Bar-Ilan University

Julia Reed will undertake a project entitled "Biblical Bodies: Reading Anatomies in Early Modern Jewish and Christian Medicine" with Professor Yehuda Halper in the Department of Jewish Philosophy at Bar-llan University. She is currently collaborating with Katja Krause's research group at the Max Planck Institute for the History of Science, "Experience in the Premodern Sciences of Soul and Body," and studies the relationships between the body and the soul in early modern medicine and Christian theology. Julia's PhD is in Religious Studies from Harvard University, and she works at the intersections of the history of medicine, Christian thought and theology, comparative religion, and early modern philosophy. She's particularly interested in the social and epistemic authority of physicians (i.e., how we learn to trust doctors, and about what), the relationships between disease and sin or evil, and how religious and medical authorities intersect, diverge, and come into conflict over time.



Nicholas Rogers

Duke University >> Tel Aviv University

Nicholas Rogers was awarded a Fulbright Postdoctoral Fellowship to pursue his research project entitled, "Disruption of Interorganismal Communicators (Extracellular Vesicles) by Microplastics" with Dr. Ines Zucker at Tel Aviv University. This research will seek to evaluate the ability of extracellular vesicles (which are membrane-bound particles produced by all cells to mediate intercellular or inter-organismal communication) to adsorb to microplastic particles in aquatic systems, which could then interfere with the ways in which microbes communicate with one another.

Nicholas received his B.S. in Chemical Engineering with a focus on environmental engineering and sustainability at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County and his Ph.D. in Civil and Environmental Engineering at Duke University. His doctoral research was focused on studying extracellular vesicles from yeast and bacteria as colloids to predict/model their fate in agricultural systems.



**Nicolle Simonovic**Kent State University >> University of Haifa

Nicolle Simonovic was awarded a Fulbright Postdoctoral Fellowship to pursue her project, "Examining psychological determinants of and cultural factors involved in vaccine hesitancy," under the mentorship of Dr. Anat Gesser-Edelsburg at the University of Haifa. In this research, she will examine public attitudes and perceptions toward COVID-19 vaccination, including levels of uncertainty and how people think about their risk. She intends to apply this information to inform vaccination interventions and media campaigns. Nicolle received her Bachelor's degree in Psychological Sciences from John Carroll University and her PhD in Psychological Sciences with specializations in Social and Health Psychology from Kent State University under the mentorship of Dr. Jennifer M. Taber.

#### Senior Scholars Fellows



**Yevgeniya Baras**Rhode Island School of Design >> Bezalel Academy of Art and Design

Yevgeniya was awarded the Fulbright Senior Scholar Award to pursue her research project "Israel, a Place of Migration and of Personal and Communal Passage as Expressed in Visual Art". She will be developing a series of paintings addressing hybrid identity, cultural translation, ideas of home, exile and belonging and teaching in the MFA program at Bezalel Academy of Art and Design. Yevgeniya holds a BA in Fine Arts, MS in Education from the University of Pennsylvania and an MFA in Painting and Drawing from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Currently she is a Critic at Rhode Island School of Design.

Yevgeniya has exhibited her work in several New York City galleries and internationally. She was a recipient of the New York Foundation for the Arts Fellowship in 2021, Guggenheim Fellowship in 2019, the Pollock-Krasner grant and the Chinati Foundation Residency in 2018, and the Yaddo Residency in 2017. She received the Artadia Prize and was selected for the Sharpe-Walentas Studio Program and the MacDowell Colony residency in 2015. In 2014 she was named the recipient of the Rema Hort Mann Foundation's Emerging Artist Prize. Her work has been reviewed in the New York Times, LA Times, ArtForum, and Art in America.



**Andrea M. Berlin**Boston University >> Tel Aviv University

Andrea M. Berlin is the James R. Wiseman Chair in Classical Archaeology in the Program in Archaeology and the Department of Religion at Boston University. She received her BA in Classical and Near Eastern Studies with honors from the University of Michigan, her MA in Syro-Palestinian Archaeology from the University of Chicago's Oriental Institute, and her Ph.D. in Classical Art and Archaeology from the University of Michigan. Her research focuses on daily life in the Graeco-Roman East, where she has been excavating and leading field projects for over 40 years. Professor Berlin has published eight books and many dozens of articles and chapters. She was awarded a Fulbright Senior Scholar Fellowship for her project "Beyond the Temple: Jewish Material Life from the Maccabees to the Revolt." She uses archaeological remains to show how Palestinian Jews of all classes crafted a materialized religious identity in the first centuries BCE-CE, one that infused their homes with a newly sacralized sensibility, but also led to a heightened sense of nationalism, which fed the catastrophic decision to revolt against Rome.



John Foggle
Quinnipiac University >> Technion – Israel Institute of Technology

John Foggle was awarded a Fulbright Senior Scholar Award to teach medical students at the Technion - Israel Institute of Technology in Haifa. In addition to his primary activity teaching a course, entitled "Wilderness, Disasters, and Global Health", he will be teaching residents at Rambam Hospital.

Dr. Foggle is an emergency physician and educator with over 32 years of clinical experience, most recently for Brown Emergency Medicine, where he is an adjunct associate professor, and at Mount Sinai Hospital in NYC. He has provided medical care to an estimated 75,000 patients in his career. He currently teaches at Brown and at the Netter School of Medicine at Quinnipiac University. His expertise is in medical simulation, wilderness medicine, disaster preparedness, trauma management, and international emergency medicine development. He worked as a consultant for the World Health Organization in Fiji and Tonga at the start of the COVID-19, pandemic and has led simulated disaster management exercises in numerous places around the globe.



Rachel S. Harris
University of Illinois >> Tel Aviv University

Rachel S. Harris is Associate Professor of Israeli Literature and Culture at the University of Illinois where she teaches in the Programs in Comparative and World Literature, and Jewish Culture & Society. Her current research explores the founding of Israeli cinema, the explosion in talent that took place in the first two decades, and the radical taboos that many of the early films depicted. Her project "With a Wider Lens: Rediscovering Lost Israeli Cinema 1948-1964" examines many newly available films thanks to recent restoration projects, and archival materials on their production, funding, censorship and reception.

She gained her doctorate from the University of Oxford (2009) and holds masters' degrees from The School of Oriental and African Studies at the University of London (2001) and The University of Edinburgh (2000).



Melissa K. Santala
Oregon State University >> Technion – Israel Institute of Technology

Melissa Santala is an associate professor in the Materials Science program at Oregon State University. She received her B.S., M.S., and Ph.D. in Materials Science and Engineering from the University of California at Berkeley. At Oregon State University, she leads a research group that uses transmission electron microscopy and complementary characterization techniques to study the atomic level-structure of oxide-metal interfaces, the thermodynamics and kinetics of crystallization of chalcogenide-based phase change materials used for memory devices, and the structure of advanced metal alloys. Her Fulbright grant will support collaborative studies with researchers at the Technion to better understand fundamental physical processes that affect the efficiency and environmental impact of important heterogeneous catalysts.



**Sherri Sheinfeld Gorin**University of Michigan >> The Hebrew University of Jerusalem

Dr Sherri Sheinfeld Gorin received a Fulbright Senior Scholar Award at The Hebrew University of Jerusalem for 2022-2023 to conduct research on "Multi-level approaches to reducing Human Papillomavirus (HPV) Vaccine Hesitancy in Israel." Vaccine hesitancy is "the reluctance or refusal to vaccinate despite the availability of vaccines." A professor of family medicine with a joint appointment in public health at the University of Michigan, a member of the Rogel Cancer Center, the Institute for Healthcare Policy and Innovation, and the Center for Global Health Equity, Dr. Sheinfeld Gorin has held positions of leadership in cancer prevention and control with an emphasis on health inequities over the past 25 years. She has published or presented over 250 scientific papers and three books and has been on the faculty of the Mayo Clinic Alix School of Medicine, and Columbia Mailman School of Public Health, a member of their cancer centers, as well as a senior advisor to the National Cancer Institute. She is an invited member of multiple NIH study sections, and scientific advisory boards, and is a recipient of numerous other honors and awards.

Michael Amrami

Macaulay Honors College at CUNY Queens College >> University of Haifa

Michael Amrami graduated summa cum laude from Macaulay Honors College at Queens College with a BA in Neuroscience and Psychology. As an undergraduate, Michael was an NIH MARC U-STAR biomedical research fellow in Dr. Maral Tajerian's neurobiology laboratory, serving as the surgical technician and investigating neurophysiological changes in chronic pain conditions. Inspired by his multicultural community service experiences at home and research in neurobiology that has established the strong link between pain conditions and comorbid mental illness, his vision is to address comorbid mental health as a tremendous public health concern. His project, titled "Addressing Mental Comorbidities of Illness with an MPH Degree from the University of Haifa," will utilize evidence-based knowledge endorsed by the MPH program and his prospective interactions with Israeli communities suffering tragedy to develop practical methods of treating mental disorders in underprivileged communities. He plans to build a mental health platform that focuses on serving Jewish-Israeli towns surrounding Gaza, an area suffering from a severe combat atmosphere. By investigating the outcome of his interventions, Michael hopes to expand the platform to those suffering tragedy at large.



Natalie Bauman
The Catholic University of America >> University of Haifa

Natalie attended the National Catholic School of Social Service at The Catholic University of America in Washington, DC, where she recently graduated with her Bachelors of Social Work Degree. During her studies, Natalie focused her research on the health disparities that result from unmitigated language barriers in healthcare for both immigrant populations and the deaf population. Natalie has been awarded a Fulbright Master's Degree Fellowship to study for her Masters of Public Health (MPH) at the University of Haifa. While at the university, she will continue in her studies and research of how health disparities are mitigated at the intersection of public health and social work.



**Becky Choi**Georgetown University >> The Hebrew University of Jerusalem

Becky Choi graduated magna cum laude, from Georgetown University with a BS (with honors) in International Politics from the School of Foreign Service, in May 2022. During her studies, she interned with various nonprofits, such as San Francisco's Coalition on Homelessness, and local policymakers within the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, California State Assembly, and the California State Treasurer. ## PhD Research Fellows



**Obadia Baker**Drexel University >>The Hebrew University of Jerusalem

Obadiah Baker is a native of Cleveland's Hough community. In 2021, Obadiah produced and composed a film score for a documentary film called "The Shadow Between Us" with The Silhouettes, from America's Got Talent, about systemic racism and healing the divide through shadow dance. This film won "Official Selection" in the 2022 Toronto Black Film Festival.

Obadiah is a graduate of the Interlochen Arts Academy, New England Conservatory of Music, and the University of Arkansas Grantham, a military intelligence and civil affairs army officer, Afghanistan War Veteran, aerospace and defense quality manager, award-winning independent film producer, and now a Fulbright scholar. He founded Tender Heart Crusades in 2009, a nonprofit organization that directs its attention toward community involvement. His Fulbright research will study the cross-cultural replication and power of shadow dance as a conflict resolution and global peace intervention technique, with a focus on the interplay of Israeli Gaga and American shadow dance on Israeli Jewish students' awareness of race and identity.



**Nolan Lebovitz**Claremont Graduate University >> Bar-Ilan University

Nolan Lebovitz was awarded a Fulbright Fellowship to pursue his research project "The Book of Esther and the Maccabees" at Barllan University under Dr. Shawn Zelig Aster. He will examine the Book of Esther's connection with the Hasmonean Period (3rd Century BCE - 1st Century CE) by studying other texts from this period that are not included in the biblical canon, to determine linguistic trends and thematic connections with Esther. By analyzing the relationship and the legacy between Esther and the Maccabees, he will be able to portray this significant Hasmonean Period as a microcosm of complex agendas and texts from which we may all continue to learn. Lebovitz is pursuing his PhD at Claremont Graduate University. Before then, he received his Masters and Rabbinic Ordination from the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies at American Jewish University, and his BA from University of Southern California's School of Cinematic Arts.



Faigy Mandelbaum

Hofstra University >> Bar-Ilan University

Faigy Mandelbaum was awarded a Fulbright Fellowship to pursue her research project titled, "The impact of childhood trauma on C-PTSD symptomology in active-duty lone soldiers" in the lab of Dr. Rachel Dekel at Bar-Ilan University. Faigy has a B.S. in Behavioral Science and Human Services from Bellevue University, a Post-Bac from Brooklyn College, an M.A. in Clinical Psychology from Hofstra University, and is a Clinical Psychology Ph.D. student at Hofstra University. Faigy is the first person to study mental health struggles in Lone Soldiers. Lone Solders are defined as soldiers who serve in the army without family support. The Israeli Defense Force (IDF) is the only army in the world to recognize the construct of the lone soldier. Faigy's research showed that Lone Soldiers endorse more childhood trauma, emotion regulation difficulties, and interpersonal difficulties when compared to non-lone Soldiers. Faigy's research also found that Lone Soldiers are more likely to screen positive for PTSD than non-lone Soldiers. Faigy will be expanding this research during her Fulbright Fellowship. She will also assess the efficacy of current Lone Soldier support networks.
